AIMING HIGH FOR VETERANS

As we prepare to celebrate Memorial Day, we need to think about what this Day really means. Some of us believe that it is just a day off work; others think that it is a day to Barbeque; and still others have no clue what this day really means.

You may ask why many Americans do not know what the day is all about. Sometimes the answer is obvious and that is because many of us do not know what the day is. We should educate ourselves and the local community on what Memorial Day really means.

"Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11, and was first observed on 30 May 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now celebrated in almost every State on the last Monday in May (passed by Congress with the National Holiday Act of 1971 (P.L. 90 - 363) to ensure a three day weekend for Federal holidays), though several southern states have an additional separate day for honoring the Confederate war dead: January 19 in Texas, April 26 in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, and Mississippi; May 10 in South Carolina; and June 3 (Jefferson Davis' birthday) in Louisiana and Tennessee."

"U.S. holiday originally held (1868) in commemoration of soldiers killed in the American Civil War, its observance later extended to all U.S. war dead. Most states conform to the federal practice of observing it on the last Monday in May, but some retain the traditional day of celebration, May 30. National observance is marked by the placing of a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery. Flags, insignia, and

flowers are placed on the graves of veterans in local cemeteries."



I am writing my last or second last Legion Link article as your Membership Chairman. At this time we have 4 Districts, Districts 2, 4, 5, and 6, who have already exceeded their 100% membership. We also have 10 Districts over 95% and 2 Districts under 95% - not acceptable. We also have 1 Area, Eastern Area Bill Walsh, Commander, over 100%. Northern Area Jim Ramos, Commander, at 99.89%, and will most likely go over 100% before the end of the day. The other 4 Areas are above 96%.

Just counting the Post membership, we are 1,371 members ahead of last year's pace. Great job by the majority of our leaders! Post 400 is down 1,572 compared to last year. I sent out to the Area and District Commanders a list of 1,792 members of the 400 Post who paid dues in 2011, but have not yet paid their 2012 dues. That list was supposed to be passed out to the various Posts in each District.

At this time I don't know if we will hit our 100% or not. For the rest of the year, which is only about 6 weeks, I am personally calling the Posts throughout the Department who are not reaching their goals. I can't possibly visit everyone, but I will try. The complaint I have is that some of you have not gotten that list of 400 members into your Posts' hands. We don't have much time left. But again, I would like to repeat that the majority of our Area and District Commanders are doing a fabulous job this year.

The first part of April, my wife and I visited the Netherlands and we did see the Bottle Bridge of Arnhem which the WWII book and movie was based on. We also visited Osterbech, nearby where there is a large Airborne Museum.

Last month I mentioned the problems in the Postal Service. Tim Tetz, Director of American Legion Legislative Division, wrote that he received a letter from a member who works at the Post Office asking him how the Legion (not me, I'm retired) could help veterans who work for the Postal Service form being 'laid off'.

In Tim's Weekly report he wrote:

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: "Does The American Legion have any idea of what is going on with the U.S. Postal Service? Postmaster General Donahoe has recommended closing hundreds of mail processing plants and displacing thousands of veteran-employees in general and thousands of disabled veterans in particular. The USPS is the second largest employer of veterans after DOD. If General Donahoe is allowed to take this irrational cost cutting measure, you're looking at the possibility of veterans being put out of a job housing market being what it is, how can anyone sell their house and relocate? This is an effort to just get people to quit out of frustration and anger. It's time The American Legion got involved and pressured Congress and the President to take action and tell Donahoe to cease and desist his plan to rein veteran's lives who have honorably served their country. I'm asking you to please get involved ASAP! I have been with the USPS for 26 years and I am rated at 90% disabled with the VA and I was told I would be without a job come June. I am just one of thousands of veterans nationwide this is happening to. DON'T ALLOW THIS TO TAKE PLACE! Thank you."

Thank you for reaching out to The American Legion on the proposals being considered within the Postal Service that could dramatically impact veterans. As you note, because of the high number of veterans who have served (and continue to work) within the USPS, we have been contacted on numerous occasions relating to this matter. We are working with some of these veterans, who are members, to assist them in their efforts towards providing a resolution.


The American Legion is an organization based on the power of the resolution. Through our posts and departments (states), the individual member can bring forward a position that leverages the Power of the Organization. Yet without a resolution from our members identifying that issue and our position in relationship to the issue, we do not take positions. This protects our organization from the whims of elected leadership, paid staff, and other pressures. It also allows us to have a broad and wide-ranging number of positions on a multitude of topics.

At the National Commander's testimony last September, a question was raised concerning the consolidation. In his reply to the committee member, Commander Wong noted that we do not have a position on the consolidation proposals at that time.

We understand that some of our members are attempting to pass a resolution in the upcoming May NEC meeting or Convention in August that will address this issue. When they do, we'll certainly advocate on behalf of the resolution.

NOTE: I'll be at that May NEC meeting. The Department of Indiana did submit a resolution thanks to the work of Paul Norton from that state.

I have just received a roster of Boy Scout units in our department chartered by American Legion Post. This information was provided by the Boy Scout of America.

In 2011, we had in the state of Florida 85 units chartered, with 2917 boy Scouts. In 2012, we now have 85 units, and 3085 Boy Scouts. We did not gain in the number of units, but we did gain 168 Boy Scouts. Nationally in 2011, we had 2659 units, and in 2012, we had 68290 which was a decline of 1200 units. Nationally we lost Scouts, but the state of Florida gained 168 Scouts. This was not a large gain, but when other states are losing, we are holding on to our own.

I want to thank Ken Nichols for all the fine work he is doing and a special thanks to a great Scout and Scout leader, Mr. Jorge Montes whose list of accomplishments would fill a book. I also want to thank Tom Gora whose work in the 5th District is outstanding. This list could go on and on, but I will stop with these three for the time being.
