When placing your legion cap down on a flat surface like a table, it shall be placed with the legion emblem facing up as a sign of respect as the left side (emblem side) is considered

" HALLOWED GROUNDS " and should be given proper respect.

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3. Making contributions (money, time or facilities) to a candidate

4. Managing, funding or organizing a Political Action Committee

When conducting candidate forums and debates, it is recommended that the emblem and post colors be removed to avoid any impression of endorsement of a particular candidate.

Volunteers working on a Legionsponsored registration and voting drives should not wear campaign buttons/ stickers or communicate their personal views about candidates, parties and issues. This does not mean that members are forbidden to show partisanship. Legionnaires may express partisan views, but they must do so without wearing the Legion cap or other Legion attire and without a direct connection to an American Legion Post.

When writing a resolution, some general considerations should be kept in mind:

1. A resolution should contain

"supporting documents," and its intent should be clearly defined.

- 2. A resolution should be free of errors of fact and law.
- 3. A resolution should have material relevance to the purposes and programs of The American Legion.

A resolution should deal with only one topic. Those that address more than one topic make it hard to process, especially if they involve topics which fall under the jurisdiction of more than one committee. They may either be rejected or amended to eliminate all but one topic. Thus topics you may have wanted to be addressed have to wait another year.

Resolutions have two major parts, a *preamble* and a *resolving section*. Each consists of one or more clauses and the whole is read in its entirety, beginning with the preamble, as one continuous complex sentence. The preamble sets forth the reasons for the resolution; the resolving section sets forth the intent of the resolution.

Next month will describe the resolving section in detail as it should be written first.

Family Centennial Recruiter Pin Each Legionnaire who

recruits family members, between July 1st and May 31st; earning 100 points/years; will receive the Legion Family Recruiter Pin. Post Commanders/Adjutants or Membership Chairman will certify and forward to department on a regular basis the certification form for processing and awards will be issued when received. Points/Years are earned by recruiting Family Members as follows: Recruit: Legionnaire 20 Points/Years, Auxiliary 20 Points/Years, SAL 20 Points/Years, Rider 10 Points/Years. Recruit 2 Family Members (i.e. Legionnaire and Auxiliary together get double points/years)

#### Post Highest Membership Award

The post with the highest percent membership in their category by Sept 30th receives \$500 1. Post of 15 to 199 members 2. Post of 200 to 499 members 3. Post of 500 to 999 members 4. Post of 1,000 to 1,499 members 5. Post1500 of 7,500 members or more

Post Membership Award The Post with the highest percent membership in their category by May 31st receives \$500.

1. Post of 15 to 199 members 2. Post of 200 to 499 members

3. Post of 500 to 999 members

4. Post of 1,000 to 1,499 members

5. Post1500 of 7,500 members or more

Coming in October we will have digital transmittals. At the post level you will be able to:

- 1. Renew
- 2. Add new members
- 3. Transfer-in existing members from other Posts. NOTE: Posts can only transfer-in members that dues are being paid. MDF must still be submitted
- 4. Utilizes electronic Echeck payments. Credit card transactions are only available for departments outside the United States. 7 business day processing time.
- 5. Eliminates the need for Post Officers to send the National/Department portion of the (3-part) membership

cards and paperchecks to the Department Headquarters office.

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#### **Our Stance**

By the time you read this article, Labor Day will have passed and Autumnal Equinox will be upon us. Here in Florida, we may not be as cognizance of the subtle changes

in the weather as those up north. What does that have to do with immigration? Frequently, there are changes to the laws and procedures affecting Immigration, Naturalization and/or immigrant status made by our Federal Executive, Legislative and Judicial Branches of Government. Just as we barely notice changes in the weather here in Florida during the Autumnal Equinox, the same applies to our understanding and notification of the many subtle changes in Federal immigration policy and reform. For questions or opinions, it is best to seek out professional attorneys who specialize in Immigration/ Naturalization.

The American Legion has a clearly defined Immigration Policy. As with

any action taken by The American Legion, you will find various Resolutions governing the organization's opinion on areas of Immigration and Naturalization. "The American Legion Policy on Illegal Immigration – A Strategy To Address Illegal Immigration In The United States" is a very comprehensive compiled document outlining the Legion's position on illegal immigration. You may Google the document by title for your read.

As your Department Chairman, I concur with The American Legion's policy in principle. For specific cases and detailed questions, I seek professional assistance. There are two areas I frequently address when speaking in public or to Legionnaires. The first concerns a foreign born spouse of a deceased U.S. Armed Forces member who lost his or her life either in a hostile combat zone or while training on military installations (addressed by The American Legion in Resolution 119, National Convention, August 2014). The second concern is the foreign born immigrant who joined the U.S. Armed Forces and for whatever reason upon receiving an honorable discharge did not complete his or her Naturalization process for citizenship. For them to

ignore the immigration law is a sure step for deportation.

According to Elizabeth Ricci of Rambana & Ricci, P.L.L.C., Immigration Attorneys, there continues to be a need to identify fellow veterans and surviving spouses who need help in a constantly changing complex immigration system. I am asking the Department Chairs, down line Commanders and all Legionnaires who interact with active duty service members, reservists and veterans around the State, to get the word out that the Department of Florida is concerned about those foreign born who have served or are serving and not Naturalized. Rambana & Ricci, P.L.L.C., Tallahassee, work with us and offer immigration legal services to veterans and the widowed foreign born spouses of deceased members of the U.S. Armed Forces who have not naturalized. We owe it to our fellow veterans and widowed spouses the opportunity to become a Naturalized Citizen of the United States of America. Information from Florida Veterans Benefits Guide 2018 Free Health Care for Recent Combat Vets

Combat veterans who were discharged or released from active service on or after Jan. 28, 2003, are eligible to enroll in the VA health care system for five years from the date of discharge or release. The enrollment period begins on the discharge or separation date of the service member from active duty service, or in the case of multiple call-ups, the most recent discharge date. Veterans, including activated Reservists and National Guard members, are eligible if they served on active duty in theater of combat operation after Nov. 11, 1998, and have been discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

According to

Wikipedia, <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/</u> <u>United States Department of Veterans</u> <u>Affairs Police</u>, "...The VA Police are an armed, federal law enforcement and protective service entity that operates in and around the various Veterans Affairs Medical Centers, National Cemeteries and other VA facilities located throughout the whole of United States to include <u>Puerto Rico</u> and the <u>United</u> <u>States Virgin Islands</u>. Among others, the VA Police are a specialized <u>federal law</u> <u>enforcement agency</u>, whose officers have full police powers derived from statutory authority to enforce all federal laws, VA rules and regulations, and to make <u>arrests</u> on VA controlled property whether owned or leased." This is similar to the F.B.I., U.S. Marshalls, Secret Service, etc.

After doing some research, with the assistance of Ms. Elizabeth Douglas, I have learned that the V.A. police working

in Florida meet the qualifications of the third bullet point of the eligibility requirement for the Law Enforcement Officer of the Year award. This information may be found at <u>https://</u><u>www.floridalegion.org/programs-</u> services/law-order/about/.

Another requirement is that you must also ensure that the officer is assigned to your local V.A. facility, whether it is an outpatient clinic, a hospital, cemetery, etc.

present are certain to miss the future."

Scouting has unrolled yet more changes to its program for our youth. Just as the American Legion has focused its recruiting efforts on the "Legion Family" the Boy Scouts has expanded to "Family Scouting". For years, as parents brought their sons to Cub Scout meetings, little sisters came along too. And they often participated in and enjoyed the many great activities that the Cubs did. But they couldn't wear the uniform or earn the badges as the boys could. Family Scouting has opened the doors to now allow young girls from kindergarten through fifth grade (ages 5 through 10) to join the Cub Scout program. This change has just been launched as you read this.

If your Post charters a Cub Scout Pack (or if you wish to start one) you will have choices and options to introduce girls to this wonderful program for young Scouts. This will require changes in organizational structure of the Pack, requirements for adult leaders to follow and more. There are too many changes to list here. But, if you read last month's Scouting Link, you know that your assigned Scout Council District Executive can provide you the details you need. If you are fortunate enough to have a Commissioner assigned to your Pack, they will also know about the Family Scouting details.

While the addition of girls to your Cub Pack is an option, and not a requirement, remember that the mission of Scouting is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetime and to develop good citizenship and leadership in them. All of this is enveloped in the legendary principles of the Scout Oath and Law and is delivered within a program of good, clean fun. These are ideals that should be instilled in all of our youth of both genders.

The executive officer/institution head listed on your Pack's charter (and not the COR) has the authority to decide if and when you are able to make this transition into Family Scouting. There will be considerations of time, space, adult volunteers and other resources that will impact the decision. It may need to be delayed or implemented incrementally. The choice is yours. Hopefully, you will be able to embrace it soon. You will have a similar choice like this for your Scout Troops next February. More on that later.

Another change of HUGE importance relates to the protection of all of our youth in Scouting. Scouting unveiled a complete revision of its Youth Protection Training program six months ago and ALL registered Scout leaders were informed. They are required to complete this new YPT online by the end of September. If they do not, they will be removed from their positions automatically and without further notice. Then, if they eventually complete the training, they will have to re-apply as leaders and go through the whole reentry process. So, make sure that all of your adult Scout leaders complete this training by the end of September.

Last Minute Change!

A recent review of our 2017-2018 Scouting Chair Manual has revealed multiple errors in policy and it has been taken off the website. It should no longer be used as a resource. A revised manual will be provided soon. In the meantime, if you have any questions about wearing Legion items on/with the Scout uniform, Scout unit bylaws, Scout unit organizational structure etc. please contact me directly.

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# CALLING ALL VOLUNTEERS: We need you!

Are you interested in joining the VetRelief Team and helping us assist veterans within your community? We have an extreme shortage of Advocates to help us do interviews as a part of the financial assistance application process for emergency funding.

What does it take to become an Advocate?

Ideally, we would like for you attend a training course during the Department Convention or Fall Conference. If you are unable to make it, or want to help before the next class, you can chat with one of our Case Workers, Michael Beaven or Jeremy Gottschalk, and they will walk you through the requirements.

Who can be an Advocate? Any member of the American Legion Family can be a VetRelief Advocate. Members of the Sons and Auxiliary are able to do interviews for PROJECT: VetRelief cases only. National's Temporary Financial Assistance Program (TFA) requires an interview to be conducted by a member of a Legion Post.

How much time does it take to do an interview? Typically, each case can require up to 2-5 hours to complete but will vary depending on the applicant and their family.

Do I have to go to the applicant's home? No, you can hold interviews at your Legion Post.



Almost one hundred percent of the proceeds from our celebration "Vets Invade the Canyon" to be held on January 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> 2019 will go to PROJECT: VETRELIEF to continue in our support of the Four Pillars of the American Legion and ensure the Veterans and active duty personnel and their families of the Great State of Florida have the ready assistance that is needed.
