books placed nationally.

On October 6th, American Legion National Historian Robert Gilmore Jr. reported to the National Executive Committee the 2020-2021 American Legion History Contests results, conducted down the hall from the committee room in the Legion's national library.

I was at National Headquarters October 4-6th observing how National Judges score history books by category. Congratulations to One Year Post Narrative, First Place: Frierson-Nichols Post 8, Winter Haven and One-Year Post Yearbook, Honorable Mention: Veterans Memorial Post 347, Lady Lake.

I will be conducting a Historian "How to" class on Friday, November 5th at 10:00 am at the Fall conference. The conference is at Renaissance Sea World, Orlando, November 5-7.

The Historian class will be on:

Friday, November 5th. 10:00am – 11:00am Tarpon B

Learn how to put History Narratives and Yearbooks together and best practices to maintain your Post's history.

As you can see, the class will last only an hour. So, if you are close by, stop in and get some meaningful pointers on how to put together a history book. I am also inviting the Auxiliary, SAL, and Riders to send their historians to this class. I will have handouts,

and I will email a PowerPoint Presentation to attendees.

While I understand that many cannot make this class, I have a solution for YOU. Send an email to me at: historian@legionmail. org (Please put "history book" in the subject line.), and I will email back to you the Historian manual, PowerPoint Presentation, and the judging sheets used for scoring. I will be looking for one more volunteer to judge history books at the Department Convention. All you have to do is follow the judging sheets, and I will assist you.

As a side note, there are only two classes: Narrative and Yearbook, when a history book is put together. There is NO "Scrapbook" or "Open Book" class. You may set your history book in a scrapbook (12 x 15) or three a ring binder, but it will be judged as a Narrative or Yearbook.

That's all for now. Be safe and remember, "No Veteran Left Behind."

Engage last Paid 2020 Members Bruce Thurber, Eastern Membershipmembership@legionmail.org



As this issue releases, we are at the Fall Conference. We still have limited information coming from myLegion. org; however, the main items we need are working. All Legionnaires must

register for myLegion, and we need to begin using it to its fullest. Currently, we are not meeting our goals running 48th in the Nation averaging 5% behind. Our next three goals are December 1, 75%, January 12, 80%, February 2, 85%. If we get over the fear of the new myLegion and process not less than weekly, we can eliminate this trend.

As of October 6, 2021, the Eastern Membership Team had six posts at 75%, and 40 had met the 55% goal. GREAT JOB.

During September, the Commanders Area Training provided many insights into the issues Posts are having and provided the opportunity to help some of you. Any district wanting to have a membership round table, please get with me. I would be glad to see if we can help get everyone fluent in myLegion.

One of National Commander Paul Dillard's priorities on membership is to engage our members. Whether they are current members, expired members, or potential members, we need to engage these individuals and show them the value of being a member of The American Legion. One of the ways that Commander Dillard has discussed in engaging members is to contact those 2020 members and offer them the ability to keep their continuous years on their membership. This offer is only for those members who were last paid in 2020 and did not renew for 2021 – they can continue their straight years if they pay for 2022. With COVID affecting many aspects of daily life over the last year and a half, this is an easy way to talk with those 2020 members and show them some goodwill.

Here is how it would work: Someone contacts a member whose last paid year was 2020 (only ones eligible for this offer), and they had five years continuous membership at the time. If they were to pay for 2022 – their straight years would now be six years. If they would also like to have 2021, the offer would be normal, and they would have to pay for the 2021 year. If they do not care or do not want to get back 2021, but pay for 2022, then the adjustment on the continuous years would have to be made at the Post by filling out a Member Data Form (MDF) to correct the years or the department can fix it within Personify.

When transmitting the dues, unless the member is paying for 2021 and 2022, do not select 2021 as part of the payment. If 2021 is selected, the payment will come out for that portion of the per capita, and it will be deducted as part of the eCheck payment processing.

* For this, only 2022 needs to be selected, and then the adjustment should be made on that member record in Personify or sent in the MDF to be processed at the National Headquarters. If the member wants both years to be added to their continuous years, then accept payment for both 2021 and 2022 membership years and then process both years through PGO.

Who will WIN the Big 12? With your help, it will be Florida, and your Post could profit from it? The Big Twelve Competition recognizes Departments that meet or exceed their pledged membership goal percentage by the March target date. The percentage does not include members gained through DMS.

The competition is broken down into six categories. The winner in each category will be reimbursed for computer equipment purchases of up to \$2,000. In comparison, the runners-up in each category will be reimbursed for computer equipment purchases of up to \$1,000.

There are times when membership in a local Post has declined, and interest in the programs is non-existent. A revitalization effort can help reenergize and breathe life back into a Post so the Post can become viable once again. One of these times is the Pandemic. Now that most Posts are getting back to normal. As American Legion members, our most sacred responsibility is to look out for each other and our fellow veterans. To reach out to members and former members who may need help, the National Executive Committee passed Resolution 18 during Spring Meetings in May 2019. The resolution calls for Buddy Checks to be conducted Legion-wide on the weeks of The American Legion's birthday, March 15 and Veterans Day. However, American Legion Posts are encouraged to perform this vital function whenever it makes sense in their communities. The idea is to reconnect with veterans who may need assistance but don't know where to go or who to ask. These contacts may be made by a personal visit, phone or email, or a combination. The important part is to reach out to veterans in your community to let them know you care and provide whatever assistance they may need. It's what we do for our battle buddies.

I want to thank everyone for the warm reception I have seen throughout Florida, both at District meetings and the training, our

Department Commander, put into motion to help at every level across the state. Training is key, only second to mentorship. Through training, one learns, even when we attend the same class, one picks up additional tidbits from even the same facilitator. I found out long ago that I needed more information/training, seeking to be better at whatever direction my feet go, striving excellence through knowledge. This is what a Mentor passes on and training (usually by a Mentor), pouring out their attained experience and knowledge. Humbling myself to the point that; I needed more understanding and ability to perform the position or chair position I swore to do.

Fall Conference will have a Post Membership Training class on Friday from 13:00 to 14:30. Where topics like: MyLegion processing, Membership tactics, How to execute a proper Membership Plan, and best of all, achieving 100% membership will be covered. We are sure that there will be plenty of questions as well.

Where are we at? And, where are we going? Well, as of October 8th, 2021, many stand around the 50% range. But there is the "Quick Draw Award," which ends on October 31st, with the extension from mid-month. At this date, 16 posts had already qualified for the award, but some were close, and still, some time remained. Not to mention we see massive membership renewal sometimes in just a short period. I hope this is the case, but you need to access the DMS and transfer some, if not all, of the 12,695 members from Post 400, not to mention the 1,870 members in Post 208.

Western Zone Membership, as of October 8th. 2021:

- 1st District is at 54.15%, one post over 75%
- 2nd District at 53.14%, three posts over 75%
- 3rd District at 43.00%, one post over 75%
- 4th District at 56.19%, one post over 75%
- 7th District at 56.19%, one post over 75%
- 8th District at 51.19%, one post over 75%
- 13th District at 47.75%, no posts over 75%
- 15th District at 47.32%, no post at 75%
- 16th District at 50.48%, no post at 75%

Western Area is in 1st Place at 54.00%, last year at this time they were at 57.60% in 3rd Northern Area is in 4th Place at 51.18%, last year at this time they were at 57.57% in 4th Central Area is in 5th Place at 50.49%. Last year at this time, they were at 55.14% in 5th Southwestern Area is in 6th Place at 49.31%, last year this time they were at 53.03% in 6th

Department is at 51.33%

Why mention all of these statistics? Because they do not define where one ends up at the end of the year or a specific deadline. Last year, Race to the Top did not have a defined bearing on where these Districts or even posts ended up just because of lagging numbers.

So why keep putting off your renewal when you have set yourself to renew eventually, though you're causing a waste of need funds in our treasury. Most choose not to be a PUFL (Paid Up For Life), and that's fine, but did you know that you could set up to be automatically renewed and not one renewal notice would be sent. Then during July (our Fiscal year start), your dues would be paid, and a report would be available for your post as a notification so your card would go out. But some do not like automatic payments of any kind, but you can sign up to have your renewal notice emailed, and you would never receive a paper renewal (by Snail-mail).

One of the essential

aspects of Americanism is teaching the next generation about our freedoms and the actual cost of remaining free. It is also instilling pride in our country and respecting our flag.

On 24 Oct 1921, Sqt. Edward F. Younger, a combat-wounded veteran of World War I.

was tasked with selecting the body of an Unknown soldier for burial at Arlington. There were four identical caskets in the City Hall of Châlons-Sur-Marne, France. After circling the room twice, Sgt. Younger made his selection by placing a spray of white roses on the casket. This Unknown Soldier was transported from Le Harve, France, aboard Admiral Dewey's flagship, the USS OLYMPIA, which arrived at the Washington Navy Yard on 09 Nov 1921. The Unknown Soldier was then taken to the Capitol Rotunda, where he lay in state until the morning of 11 Nov 1921. On the morning of the Third Anniversary of the Armistice that ended World War I. this Unknown soldier would reach his final resting place in Arlington National Cemetery.

Our responsibility is to teach the next

generation what it means to be an American, which can be accomplished through our programs. Everything from "America's Pastime" - Baseball / American Legion Baseball; to understanding the value of the U.S. Constitution in our Oratorical Program; is part of who we are as The American Legion.

So far, it has been a very slow start to the JSSP Postal Marksmanship Registration for the First Round for Florida. The online application was available on September 1st on the website:

legion.org The individual registering the team; usually, the coach, must set up an account. This will take them to the link for CMP to start the online process. The team coach/adult leader must complete a Risk Management Course, and background check online before getting the Post Commander to sign off on the Affiliation Form. I had the opportunity to

I often tell young Veterans searching for a job in Law Enforcement or the Fire service my own story. When I was discharged from the U.S. Navy, I was advised by my Dad (WWII Army Veteran and member

of American Legion Post 35 St. Augustine) that I should attend school on the G.I. Bill. So I went to the St. Augustine Police Academy, and the Government paid for the school and paid me to go. When I graduated, I was hired by St. Johns County Sheriffs Office ahead of the other classmates because of my Veteran status. There were two other Veterans in the class that also got hired by other agencies. (Veterans Preference) Thirty-Three (33) Years later, I retired from the Osceola County Sheriffs Department.

So I saw this article from the News 4 Jacksonville, Florida (News4Jax) Titled: Florida launches nationwide law enforcement recruitment initiative with a new website. Website: BeAFloridaHero.com offers a onestop shop for law enforcement careers in the Sunshine State.

A new recruitment initiative launched by Attorney General Ashley Moody's Office encourages job seekers from across the country to come "Be a Florida Hero."

The initiative aims to draw recruits into law enforcement careers in Florida by launching a website that collects law enforcement career opportunities across Florida into a first-of-it-kind, on-stop shop.

According to the National Police Foundation, a majority of Police Departments nationwide experienced staffing shortages in 2020. Reports attribute the shortages to municipality budget cuts, low morale, among Officers and increasing retirement rates.

Moody said fewer Officers on patrol leads to a less safe populace and an environment ripe for crime.

"Florida is the most pro-law enforcement

state in the nation. We want Officers from areas that don't value their service to know that here in the Sunshine State, we back our blue," Moody said in a news release. "Florida enjoys a long tradition of supporting law enforcement. and we have leadership that understands and appreciate what it takes to protect and serve."

Governor Ron DeSantis touted incentives like passing a pro-police law and proposals, including a \$5000 signing bonus for new officers, an academy scholarship program, and out-of-state relocation financial support.

The Be A Florida Hero website includes an interactive map of Florida where users can click on different areas of the state and see exactly where open law enforcement jobs are located. The website also includes in-depth descriptions of each branch of law enforcement in Florida, with contact information for potential job seekers to get in touch with the right agency.

Brother and Sister Veterans, soon this type of website, I'm sure, will someday be available for Fire and Paramedic jobs, and you as a Veteran will get preference.


District 1 Inaugural Class of Female Eagle Scouts: To be a member of the Boy Scouts of America's Inaugural Class of female Eagle Scouts this year, the Scouts earned that rank by February 8, 2021.

Nearly 1,000 young women did a remarkable accomplishment given that membership in Scouts BSA - the 11–17-year-old program formerly known as Boy Scouts - wasn't open to females until February 2019. Four of those new Eagles hail from Scouts BSA troops that are chartered to Department of Florida District 1 American Legion posts, according to District 1 Scouting Chair Angle Walker. They include Tina Wehmeyer from Troop 1157 (Post 221 in Niceville), Helen Works from Troop 321G (Post 356 in Panama City), Ania Calbough from Troop 340G (Post 340 in Pensacola), and Sydney Walker, who is a dual member of both Troop 340G and Troop 451G (Post 78 in Milton). Of note, Ms. Works is currently a Cadet 3rd Class at the US Air Force Academy. In total, more than

As you read this, we're all preparing to attend the Department's Fall Conference. In connection with that, today, November 1st, is the cut-off day to register for what will be yet another

informative and helpful Post Service Officer class to be held November 5-6. This position at the Post goes far beyond just claims assistance, and your Service Officers are a priceless resource, so once again, I encourage all Posts to send someone to the class.

The VA hospitals and CBOC's continue to limit what volunteers can do; however, our VAVS volunteer personnel continue to show their dedication by helping in as many ways possible. In line with VA healthcare, I'd like to clarify a couple of things. Several years

ago, the VA instituted a "means test," Based upon a veteran's eligibility and income; they can be placed in one of eight Priority Groups. Each veteran's situation is different. However, I urge everyone to use VA Form 10-10EZ to register. Additionally and regarding travel reimbursement: travel pay may be paid to veterans who are rated at 30% or higher, those who are traveling for treatment of a service-connected condition, veterans who are receiving a VA pension, or those traveling for a Compensation and Pension exam. Yes, there is a deductible of \$6 per round trip; however, this can be waived under certain circumstances.

We've recently learned that due to many problems caused by the COVID pandemic, over 600,000 claims are waiting to be processed by the VA, 200,000 of which are considered "backlogged." In an attempt to remedy this, the VA is hiring and training 2,000 new employees. This will, of course, take some time, but it's a step in the right direction.

With October having been Agent Orange awareness month, we must remain mindful that it doesn't end there. Not only are fellow veterans still battling illnesses of many types, but many have already died due to Agent Orange-related conditions. There is now a bill in Congress to include those veterans who served in Guam, and they deserve that recognition and help.

Once again, I encourage every Post to reach out to women veterans locally not only for membership purposes but because their contributions can be of such great value. We owe it to them to let them know that they're part of the veteran family and community and that we honor their service to our country.

As I always do, I will close this article by wishing everyone good health. Stay safe, and I look forward to seeing you in Orlando!

A new committee created at the 49th National Convention is the 50th Convention Committee. The last Committee to report, and its first time reporting, was the Century Committee (CENTCOM) by Chairmen Joe P. National Judge Advocate. This Committee was created to replace three former committees by incorporating them into one Committee's duties.

Afghanistan Veterans welcomed Home by Florida Legion Post, Community

The American Legion ~ American Legion Post 149 of Newberry, FL was featured in a National article on September 28, 2021:

A lot of effort went into the planning and carrying out of the Newberry, Fla., American Legion Post 149 "Welcome Home Afghanistan Veterans" event on Sept. 25.

But to event coordinator and Post 149 Legionnaire Bob Watson, it was worth every second of effort. Watson estimates around 300 veterans and their families attended the event, which kicked off with a parade and was followed by a ceremony and other activities. Originally planned to take place at Post 149, the number of vendors wanting to participate forced organizers to change the venue to the 7,000-square-foot Clark Plantation.

Seeing the results of the hard work "felt real good," Watson said. "But it was all for the vets. It's worth it. It's well worth the effort we all put in."

The 15-minute parade included American Legion Riders and other veteran motorcycle groups, Buchholz High School Junior AFROTC, military and first-responder vehicles, vintage automobiles and two new M1152A1 Humvee cargo and troop carrier vehicles.

Following the parade, a ceremony took place at Clark Plantation that included remarks from local and state politicians.

During the ceremony, Newberry Mayor Jordan Marlowe said, "Today is not about why we went to Afghanistan, today is not about how long we were there, and today is not about how we left. Today is about saying thank you to the men and women who answered the call of their country."

An expo also took place into the evening that included information booths on veteran benefits, counseling, employment and housing. Other activities included a car show, a silent auction and raffle, a mobile

blood donation center, live music, food vendors, and a bounce house, face painting and balloon artist for children.

"When I came home from Vietnam, we didn't get much help," Watson said. "So I wanted something when they came home they could go to, at one location where you have the resources they'd need to be able to help them out."

Others shared similar messages, something Watson wanted from each speaker. "They were told no politics, and they abided by the rules," said Watson.

Watson was able to speak to a few of the Afghanistan veterans who attended the event, saying they "were very pleased and happy." Post 149 Adjutant Vickie Van Buren said that's what the event was about.

"Back in the '60s and early '70s, when our (military) came back from Vietnam, they weren't greeted with very much respect," she said. "This, today, is to honor those individuals coming back from Afghanistan to make sure that they don't experience the same thing that our Vietnam vets experienced when they came home."

Bringing Solace to the "Lost Souls"; Challenge 22 in the Panhandle

Doreen Prasad ~ "Before you go to bed tonight, 22 veterans will have committed suicide."

October 2, 2021, proved to be a memorable and historic day for the American Legion Post 382 in Navarre, Florida. Not only did this day commemorate their largest fundraiser since inception, but it also bared witness to the hard work and dedication of its members and the community infused to bring to light an issue affecting so many veterans nationally. This historic day marked the Post's First Annual Challenge 22 Event.

A Challenge 22 event is hosted by the American Legion Post with support from the local community and veterans to raise awareness, funds and produce increased resources targeted to curb veteran suiciderelated from unseen injuries during their service while supporting and defending the constitution of the United States and promoting Americanism.



All proceeds from a Challenge 22 event go directly to the primary benefactor, the Department of Florida Project VetRelief (PVR)/ Suicide Prevention Initiative (SPI). The SPI subcommittee then makes recommendations to the PVR Board of Directors regarding where and how much of those funds should be directed.

PROJECT: VetRelief has established Strategic Partnerships with existing veterans service organizations who are already focused on mental health. Funding either sponsors veterans through these vetted programs or provides them the opportunity to expand their services to save more veterans' lives.

American Legion Post 382 raised a total of \$37,030. The chapter hosted 17 vendors, solicited in-kind service donations of \$3,070.25, silent auctions and raffle tickets worth \$5,843, and acquired individual and company pledges from 50 organizations summing \$37,030. Additionally, the project









team was supported by approximately 60 volunteers from the 7th Special Forces Group, Navarre High School Junior ROTC, members from the 1 Special Operations Wing, and 24 Special Operations Special Tactics Training Squadron enabling event success. The combination of the local youth, post members, active-duty servicemen and women, local businesses, veterans service organizations, and community members proved to be a masterpiece that brought awareness to the cause and enlightened the community of some veterans' detrimental future has absent the much-needed resources.

Finally, the intangible outcome worth mentioning was the immediate impact from the stories shared, the relationships built, and a community banding together in a manner never done before for a crisis so near and dear to all Legionnaires promoting Americanism and preserving its values.











My Brother's Keeper

N'Jhari Jackson, 2019 American Legion National Eagle Scout of the Year Runner-Up

My brother's keeper holds true post military service "If I can help a fellow brother adjust after serving, then I am my brother's keeper—that's what it's all about," says Ezekiel Everett, Jr. disabled army veteran.

Everett is a 100% disabled Army veteran who in addition, to his physical disability has chronic health issues that render him disabled. He did tours in Malaysia, Germany and Viet Nam.

I asked Everett about his life post military service. "At first, it was mental torture every day and night. I asked myself if I would ever be employable," says Everett.

Did other veterans show you the ropes after leaving the military? Other veterans did their best to help, "but no one really had definite roads to what I needed—just kind of try this or that kind of advice," says Everett.

"I had to face that I was a washed-up serviceman with no direction on how I was going to survive outside of the military," says Everett.

His reflection and concerns about his life—prognosis on making it as a civilian were stirring. The fear of uncertainty prompted Everett to look up information contained in the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Act.

He says, "Most newly separated vets don't even know where to begin to look for help and fall into deep depression."

"It is important for veterans to help each other like members of fraternities and sororities do for each other—share information and uplift one another," says Everett.

Everett sustained disabling injuries during his tours of duty. He lived in Washington, D.C. until 1990. He relocated to Jacksonville, Florida, after his military career. He was able to find work with the U.S. Census and U.S.

Postal Service after some searching.

In speaking with a VA nurse on veteran's post service, Jennifer Zubrick, explained that every military member must process through Transition Assistance Program six months prior to leaving service.

TAP explains how to write a resume utilizing skills learned in the military, interview practice, job hunt assistance, benefits such as the GI Bill and applying for VA benefits according Zubrick.

"During this period, it also helps to talk to someone from Disabled American Veterans for advice and assistance on how to file for disabilities incurred while on active duty," says Zubrick.

Zubrick also says, "She's noticed an emergence of assistance programs for veterans that are missing limbs, experience PTSD, or have other traumatic issues." One such program is Equine Therapy for Military Veterans utilizes horses for therapy of some of the above veteran conditions," says Zubrick.

Everett moved around a bit in search of work including Gainesville and Jacksonville before dropping anchor in Tampa in 2010. He suffered a major heart attack and stroke in Feb. 2012. Everett spent 3-4 years recovering at James A. Haley VA Hospital Haley's Cove Nursing Facility in Tampa.

Everett laments that the VA program, Vocational Rehabilitation helped put things in perspective—helped him know "he still had useful skills, and that he was still employable."

According to the VA national website, Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment (VR&E), sometimes referred to as the Chapter 31 program, provides services to eligible servicemembers and veterans with service-connected disabilities to help them prepare for, obtain, and maintain suitable employment or achieve independence in daily living.

Voc Rehab is an Entitlement Program which a vocational rehabilitation counselor works with the veteran to determine if an employment handicap exists.

When asked if he has ever felt discriminated against because of his disability Everett responded—"Sadly, yes."

"Despite my time with Voc Rehab," employment did not come easy," says Everett. He had an employer tell him, "Disabled veterans get enough money from Uncle Sam, and that I should just get my check— not take a job from someone who does not have a government slush fund," said Everett.

James Ferguson, DAV Hospital Coordinator at the Tampa VA hospital helps veterans apply for benefits including disability. He makes sure veterans are aware of the various programs available to returning veterans. There are a lot of returning veterans who don't know the benefits available to them and therefore fail to take advantage of them—leaving a feeling of "helplessness and sometimes anger," says Ferguson.

He explains although people with disabilities are forced to self-identify as being disabled, some employers can go too far and intrude into a disabled person's medical history.

"This can keep some people with disabilities especially veterans from applying for work," says Ferguson.

Everett elaborated that there are very strong attitudes against veterans returning to the workforce for that very reason. According to Everett, many people feel veterans especially disable veterans take jobs away from nonvets.

Some organizations do adhere to veteran's priority law (Veterans Preference Act) where applicable. Federal agencies can participate in "special hiring practices" where they give preference to persons with disability

including veterans and disabled veterans without being accused so discrimination. The above-mentioned practices appear to what Everett spoke of when he talked about people being upset about veteran hiring practices.

Everett credited knowledge he learned through Voc Rehab along with other legislation described in the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990). The USERRA of the ADA, protects veterans from employment discrimination. Title I of the ADA prohibits private and state and local government employers with 15 or more employees from discriminating against individuals based on disability Retired professor Primus Tillman a retired disabled U.S. Navy veteran often felt overwhelmed maneuvering as a civilian. Unlike many veterans, he made it a priority to research available benefits and "how to be successful in obtaining those benefits," says Tillman.

Tillman says, "When I was not working on obtaining benefits, I engaged in hobbies including digital design, photography and art classes."

Like Everett, Tillman stresses participating in Voc Rehab and other programs both recreational and academic can make a big difference in adjusting to civilian life.

Tillman like Everett stressed the importance of "looking out for fellow veterans" and helping them "find their way."

Everett believes Title I of the ADA and USERRA are much needed and requires continual "tweaking" but what the legislation has been able to do thus far, for people with disabilities has been phenomenal compared to life prior to ADA laws.

Everett mentions that disabled veterans "need more advocates to help explain disability and veteran's rights" especially those who don't participate or qualify for Voc Rehab. He thinks the VA overloads veterans

with mailers and pamphlets about different disability rights.

"The overload can be a trigger for those who suffer from PTSD and other mental health issues," says Everett.

Everett describes being overwhelmed with all the mail with no one to explain things in "simple terms except the few things he picked up at appointments or sipping coffee with another disabled veteran in the VA canteen," said Everett.

Once made aware and they begin benefitting from programs designed to help better their lives after returning home—veterans breathe "a sigh of relief," says Ferguson.

Everett explains after going through vocational rehab, but prior to his heart attack and stroke, he soaked up as much information as he could and started regurgitating what he learned to other disabled veterans.

He realized that he had garnered a "following and trust among veterans seeking to have information explained—in the simplest of terms," said Everett.

One of the highlights of living at the nursing facility for him was hosting Bingo every night at 6pm and Game Day once a week. Game Day is where I encountered Everett while volunteering. His biggest goal—to walk again. He also aspires to one day write a book.

When asked where should veterans turn when trying to figure their next move? Everett said, "organizations like the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars are tight knit groups and you can always find someone to steer you in the right direction." American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars understand— "my brother's keeper."

Everett has since moved out of the VA Nursing Facility and purchased a home along with having a van outfitted with a lift and adaptive driving capabilities. He is a coach for the VA competitive adaptive sports teams including balloon volleyball and ping pong.

Monique Masterpasqual, who worked in a VA hospital spinal cord injury unit after completing nursing school says, "on top of dealing with lifelong physical and mental injuries, not knowing the ins and outs of veteran benefits "can be overwhelming for veterans."

I am thankful knowing the VA does have a DAV hospital coordinator who rounds on the spinal cord unit to help wounded veterans apply for benefits which relieves family members from trying to figure it out, says Masterpasqual.

Everett feels good being able to be active by helping other disabled veterans train and enjoy recreation despite being dependent on a wheelchair. He travels to the Gainesville area to help other veterans form wheelchair games teams.

"Having outlets such as VA sponsored wheelchair games and other adaptive sports, relieves a lot of stress and make veterans feel not forgotten," says Masterpasqual.

Coaching other veterans on their entry into civilian life helps Everett stay connected to other disabled and or retired veterans giving him ample time to answer questions, help complete forms, and just "support his fellow brethren as he put it."

Because according to Everett, "I am my brother's keeper."
