Child Welfare is Giving Children a Forever Home

I'm proud to say that the American Legion family has had another strong year of supporting the Child Welfare Foundation (CWF).

The CWF ended the 2020-2021 program

year with \$435,312 in donations. Of these donations, more than \$317,000 came from the Sons of The American Legion – their

single largest contributor to CWF, they've donated nearly nine million since 1988.

Gift of Adoption is a 2021 American Legion Child Welfare Foundation grant recipient of \$25,000 to help provide adoption assistance for children in the United States. This is the second \$25,000 CWF grant provided to Gift of Adoption whose mission (since its founding in 1996) is to "provide adoption assistance grants to bring the most vulnerable children into permanent, loving families and really changing the trajectory of their lives."

Gift of Adoption supports children who are at risk of entering foster care, aging out of foster care or an orphanage, and who have medical needs. They focus on keeping siblings together through adoption.

In its twenty-five-year history, Gift of Adoption has provided over eleven million in grants to unite more than 3,800 children with permanent families. The organization's goal this fiscal year is to unite 525 children with families in honor of its 25th anniversary and The American Legion CWF grant is helping to achieve that.

Recruiting Tips

We need to get a jump on this year's membership. Every District has Posts that were under 90% at the end of June. If your post is in that category and you would like some help, contact

your District Commander, Department Membership Chairperson, or our Department Post Development Chairperson. Any District that would like to have a revitalization contact your Area Commander and we can start the ball rolling. Help from National is available if we give sufficient notice. They assist with publicizing and materials.

Recruiting Tips

- Always be ready with a two to three minute 'elevator pitch' on the importance and benefits of Legion membership.
- Download the Legion app. You'll be ready to sign up members on the spot.
- Get some door hangers and modify them with your post information. You're now ready to reach out to potential members even if you're not face-to-face.
- 4. Keep a few membership applications handy.
- 5. Have a supply of 'Why You Should Belong', and 'This Is The American Legion' for information.

- Work your post's expired member listings that can be found under the "Find Members in my Area" section of www.mylegion.org.
- Build and maintain a relationship with military installations and the person in charge of veteran admissions and/or veteran student organizations that may be on college campuses.
- Network with first responders, civic and community organizations, as well as other veteran service organizations to expand your pool of potential members.
- 9. Ensure that your Post is building its brand:
 - Send a localized version of the post's CPR to the media outlets in your area, and that this same information is published in the Post's newsletter.
 - b. Make sure your Post is actively participating in at least one program, and that it is done well.
 - Make sure your Post is an asset to the community; inform them of your Post's programs, participation in parades, service activities, etc.
 - d. Be seen in your Legion apparel.
 - e. Don't narrow your focus to veterans in only one or two war eras. Any veteran may be eligible, but you won't know if you don't ask!

Don't let all your hard work go to waste - RETAIN THE MEMBERS YOU HAVE

The Commander's Area Training has begun and will include a session on membership.

Bring your general questions to the floor, however, for in-depth questions, please email them to me.

I have also started District specific visits. So far, I have scheduled with District 17 at Post 120, August 14th, District 5 at Post 250 September 5th, District 6 Post 63 September 18th. If you would like to host a training session or round table, contact your District Commander.

The 2021 Virtual National Membership Workshop was held July 26-29 and the sessions are available on the National Site under membership training.

Only 2022 membership cards are currently available on myLegion.org. If you see a blank page, please renew your membership for 2022.

Finally, as we strived to meet our goals last year, there were 14,000 AD's in Florida; we only transferred 3,251 into posts, retention of those is 70%, and you get credit immediately for them toward your goal when you bring them in. Select your local Zip Codes and the 2022 year begin working them. Next, make a list of 2021 and start making calls to see if you can get them to renew with you. Let's get all 5 Race to the Top Categories, both 1st and 2nd place.

Leadership Retreat to do just that so that all of us are not spending valuable time attempting to communicate over actually communicating.

Every member of The American Legion should have MyLegion access, not just chairs or officers.

MyLegion is at the top of everyone's lists. Mostly for accessibility issues, and so far, it has been that either the Post Commander and/or Adjutant email addresses (which is how they gain access) do not match "National Last official listing." The Officer report (Which was due by June 15th) sent to Department, would then be forwarded to National as the official members to have access to privileged membership information and processing. Without these email addresses (the fingerprint

to gain access) those posts are not going to gain access without going through the Department Adjutant (Bruce Comer). Once this access is attained, those officers can determine who (Membership Team members) they want to access their post's information. Once this is done you're ready to learn the navigation of the MyLegion website which is navigated differently than when The American Legion was on the Legacy program (we are now on "Go Live"). Bruce Thurber and I are here and ready to help, and therefore our Commander has set statewide training for MyLegion and other areas, I am looking forward to these, to meet every Post's membership team, as well as show availability to them whenever they need.

The Department Commander and I are not just encouraging posts to transfer DMS (Post 0400's) members to local posts across the

state, we do not want them to be lost to attrition or discouragement from feeling unwanted. These members are already in "The American Legion" but need a home, your Home Post. These members (around 14,000) have already taken the first step, and with a good portion of Posts across the state who have missed their 100% to Goal, this is a superb way to create an influx to your roster and attain your 100%. Plus make them feel like part of the "Legion Family" by inviting them to transfer. In fact, every officer at my post (including myself) are from the DMS. One thing I hear is, "we need more volunteers," and my entire post is run from these DMS members who are the workforce at the post. Why are you skeptical about having them in your post? They are no different than someone you meet in a parking lot or the grocery store, verification of military character must be done for both types of veterans.

Study: Police Officers and Firefighters Are More Likely to Die by Suicide than in Line of Duty

A white paper commissioned by the Foundation revealed that first responders (police officers and firefighters) are more likely to die by suicide then in the line of duty. in 2017 there were at

least 103 firefighter suicides and 140 police officer suicides. In contrast, 93 firefighters and 129 police officers died in the line of duty. Suicide is a result of mental illness, including depression and PTSD, which stems from constant exposure to death and destruction.

The white paper study, the Ruderman White Paper on Mental Health and Suicide of First Responders examines several factors contributing to mental health issues among first responders and what leads to their elevated rate of suicide. One study included in the white paper found that on average police officers witness 188 critical incidents during their careers. This exposure to trauma can lead to several forms of mental illness. For example, PTSD and depression rates among firefighters and police officers have been found to be as much as 5 times higher

than the rates within the civilian population, which cause these first responders to commit suicide at a considerably higher rate (firefighters 18/100,000, police officers 17/100,000 and the general population 13/100,000). Even when suicide does not occur untreated mental illness can lead to poor physical health and impaired decisionmaking.

In addition, the Firefighter Behavioral Health Alliance (FBHA) estimates that approximately 40% of firefighter suicides are reported. If these estimates are accurate, the actual number of 2017 suicides would be approximately equal to 257, which is more than twice the number of firefighters who died in the line of duty.

First Responders are the heroes who run toward danger every day to save the lives of others. "They are also human beings, and their work exerts a toll on their mental health", said Jay Ruderman, President of the Ruderman Family Foundation. "It is our obligation to support them in every way possible to make sure that they feel welcome and able to access life-saving mental health care. This white paper should serve as a critical call to action to all who care about our heroes in red and blue."

The white paper also goes on to lay out several barriers that prevent first responders from accessing necessary mental health services to help them cope with trauma. Experts describe the shame and stigma surrounding mental health within professions that prioritize bravery and toughness, and the public remains largely unaware of these issues, since the vast majority of first responder suicides are not covered by the mainstream media. Additionally, of the 18,000 Law Enforcement Agencies across the United States approximately 3-5% have suicide prevention training programs.

We need to end the silence that surrounds the issue of first responders' mental health. We should celebrate the lives of those lost to suicide- at National monuments such as the National Law Enforcement Memorial, in the media, and within police and fire departments around the Country. Ruderman added," Departments should encourage and require first responders to access mental health services annually. This will enable our heroes to identify issues early and get the help that they need. It will save lives."

Combat veterans who were discharged or released from active service on or after January 28, 2003, are eligible to enroll in the VA Health Care System for five years from the date of discharge or release. The enrollment

period begins on the discharge or separation date of the service member from active-duty service, or in the case of multiple call-ups, the most recent discharge date. These are caused by exposure to particulate matter during their tours of duty, a/k/a Burn Pit Exposure. Let's help by directing them to Post Service Officers to get the claims

process started. To speed up just the appeals process, the VA has appointed twenty new Veterans Law Judges with an eye towards reducing the wait time for claims that have been denied and are in appeal.

While this pandemic persists, the VA hospitals and CBOC's (Community-Based Outpatient Clinics) have greatly limited what volunteers can do, our VAVS volunteer personnel continue to show their dedication by helping in as many ways possible, even virtually. They often reach out by phone to those among us who've been affected by COVID to let them know they're not alone.

In line with VA healthcare, the VA has stepped up its availability for mental healthcare. Not only has the pandemic caused many to suffer physically but emotionally as well. Another element is that now that the situation in Afghanistan being

what it is there. Many of our fellow veterans of that war will need a hand to reach out and an ear to listen to them. Let's step up and wrap our arms around them.

As I've mentioned before, women veterans now have greater access to healthcare than ever, and it doesn't end there. Along with other steps, the VA is conducting a two-day virtual boot camp for women veteran entrepreneurs. It's been recognized that women veterans have a strong work ethic and success rate. I encourage every Post to reach out to our sister veterans not only for membership purposes but because their contributions can be of such great value.
