

During my tenure I have served with integrity and honesty, keeping the American Legion, Department of Florida at the forefront of our National Organization.



many communities and in many lives. Here's what was reported last year (These numbers only reflect 85 posts, which is about 30% reporting):

- 2,227 pints donated
- 1,682 donors reported
- 334 drives held

We have almost 300 posts in the department, imagine the numbers more post reported their numbers as well.

I'd like to congratulate Post 90 (13th District) for winning the Margaret Skaggs Award and Post 348 (12th District) for winning the runner up award. Both did an excellent job. I would like to add that we only had about a 10% award nomination rating from posts. I hope this year more posts will submit their

paperwork. I would like to see at least a 20% award nomination rating.

I have already been to a post blood drive this past month. If your post is hosting a blood drive, please send me an email at blooddonor@floridalegion.org to let me know and I will try and come to the event.

Remember that this is a program that usually involves very little work. Normally, the post just needs to reach out to their local blood bank to schedule a drive at their location. One thing that I usually tell people is that when doing so, try and schedule it during an event to try and increase the possible number of donors.

I am Honored to have been asked by Commander Butts to return as your membership chairman for the 104th Membership Year of the American Legion.

Membership is going to be a struggle this year.

As the cost of living continues to rise people are looking at ways to save. They are giving up pets, cancelling insurance and becoming homeless. Paying dues is not a priority unless we have something to offer them in this terrible time. The American Legion provides life-changing assistance and guidance for veterans, military personnel, their families, and communities in thousands of ways every day around the world. Help comes in the form of personal assistance, cash grants, donated goods, disaster relief, labor, networking, volunteerism, and advocacy.

In 2015 we had a \$5 National per capita increase in dues and 2 million members. Our 2022 goal is 1,579,502 so we are losing members quickly. If this small amount of money affected us then what is going

to happen now. We need to find ways to encourage renewals and returns by making our Posts something our members need. Human beings are inherently social creatures. As far back as we can trace, humans have traveled, hunted, and thrived in social groups and for good reason.

Humans who were separated from their tribe often suffered severe consequences. Social groups provide us with an important part of our identity, and more than that, they teach us a set of skills that help us to live our lives. Feeling socially connected, especially in an increasingly isolated world, is more important than ever. The benefits of social connectedness shouldn't be overlooked. The largest Veterans Social group is The American Legion. We can help by keeping them active with little or no cost events that include their family.

the economy. Recipients should be kept secret we don't want to embarrass anyone.

### Fireworks and PTSD

Blanton-Thompson American Legion Post 155 in Crystal River, Florida makes local news channels and American Legion National HQs headlines for hosting the 'Escape the Fireworks' event. Auxiliary Unit 155 member, Vicky Post, organized the event in memory of a friend, Sean Liebman, who took his life by suicide last July at the age of 30 years old.

Staff Sgt. Liebman, a ten-year veteran of the U.S. Air Force, who served most of his time as a field medic, was assigned to an Army unit in Afghanistan. He received an honorable discharge and a 90 percent disability rating in June 2020, after which, he moved to Crystal River and began bowling at Manatee Lanes, where he met Vicky Post and became friends.

It was in Crystal River where, in the early morning hours of 5 July of last year, Liebman took his own life. He was battling post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), so any loud noise could upset him and make him restless. It is believed that the loud booms and the flashes of the fireworks took him and his PTSD to a place he couldn't come back from, which resulted in him taking own his life.

When she found out what he went through, she knew that something needed to be done. Veterans with PTSD needed a safe haven to go on the Fourth of July so they wouldn't have to hear the loud noises and booms from the fireworks.

That's how the "Escape the Fireworks" came about. From 6 PM to midnight, the event provided Veterans a safe haven away from the fireworks with a DJ, Karaoke, food, and beverages.

When Post lost her original venue for the event, she approached Post 155 Commander, Douglas Hockenberry, about renting out the post's back hall for the event. Commander Hockenberry didn't hesitate and committed the Post to host the event, at no charge. The American Legion is here to support our veterans, so this was the least Post 155 could do to support her and our community

#### Veterans.

Post wasn't sure how many people would come out. She anticipated more of her friends and people she knew would come out in support, but there were, actually more she didn't know that attended. In total, by the end of the evening, 92 people had signed in – many more than she had expected. One of her main goals was to increase awareness – mission accomplished.

Post is hoping to make "Escape the Fireworks" an annual event in Crystal River and hopefully, expand it to other local towns that have fireworks around the Fourth of July and New Year's Eve holidays.

However since then, we have grown our strategic partner list to ten (10), and during this past quarter, we granted \$46,000 in support! Our funding sponsors veterans through their processes or allows these *thoroughly-vetted* organizations to expand or enhance their programs. Since 2019, we have given nearly \$240,000 in our quarterly funding rounds!

This growth is largely due to the support we have received from the Florida Legion Family, primarily the Florida American Legion Riders. Additionally, our PVR/SPI Committee has been dedicated in establishing quality relationships with veteran organizations who have proven results and are positively impacting mental health in veterans. We pride ourselves on knowing that these organizations listed below are on the same mission we are... *ending veteran suicide*!

Regarding legislation, we're asking that you contact your elected representatives and ask for their support with H.R 1282, the Major Richard Starr Act. This bill was introduced by Florida's own Rep. Gus Bilirakis and addresses concurrent receipt issues that face so many military retirees here in Florida.

In cooperation with the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network, at-risk veterans can now dial a 3-digit number..988..and instantly be connected to one of over 200 crisis centers to receive help that can often get between the veteran and suicide. << Scouting continued from page 12

Boy Scouts of America National Membership Fee Increase: The value of Scouting is undeniable for those within the program and the greater public, and the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) is committed to continuing to offer this unmatched opportunity to young people and families nationwide. As costs on many daily goods and services continue to rise dramatically, the BSA has worked to keep its membership fee as low as possible. However, these external pressures continue to have an effect, and the annual membership fee must be increased to address the fiscal realities necessary to continue delivering a safe and quality Scouting program. To ensure the organization has the resources to fulfill the promise of Scouting, the following national membership fee structure will take effect August 1, 2022. If your post charters a Cub Scout pack, Scouts BSA troop, Venturing crew and/ or Sea Scout ship, please work with the **Chartered Organization Representative** assigned by your post to that BSA unit to ensure that those Scout families that may have difficulty accommodating the fee increase have as much support as your post can provide.

- \$75 for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts participants (\$3 increase)
- \$45 for Exploring participants (no change in cost)
- \$30 for council-paid memberships (no change in cost)
- \$45 for all adult volunteers (no change in cost, includes cost of background check)
- \$100 for a unit charter/affiliation fee (\$25 increase)
- \$25 one-time joining fee for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts (Not pro-rated, no change in cost)
- \$15 for Scout Life magazine; this is the first price increase since 2005 (\$3 increase)

It seems that the VA has finally recognized what we've known for quite awhile..that Florida is one of 4 states that has the fastest growing veteran population. With that said, the VA has begun evaluating how best to shift their resources to better serve veterans.

In closing this month's article I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their unselfish cooperation and hard work. I look very much forward to the coming year and what we'll be able to accomplish together.

### **DEC MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION**

A regular meeting of the Department Executive Committee (DEC), called by Department Commander Jerry Brandt, was held at the Hilton Orlando Lake Buena Vista on Thursday, June 16, 2022, at 3:00 PM. Sixty-three DEC members were present.

Decisions of the DEC in the order in which they were discussed. included:

### 1. Ratification of Appointments

Commander Brandt appointed Roger Hewitt to fill the vacancy caused by the untimely passing of 2nd District Commander Steve Mears, which were ratified.

Commander Brandt announced that he appointed Kevin Bartlett as the Parliamentarian for the remainder of the Department Convention.

### 2. Post Charters not at Charter Strength

Reports were heard on four Posts (59, 131, 195, and 114) that were not at charter strength. The District Commander for those four posts will continue to work with the posts and conduct revitalizations. The District Commanders will provide an update on these posts at the DEC meeting during Department Fall Conference in November.

#### 3. Ratification of New Posts

The temporary charters of Moore Haven Post 416 and Defuniak Springs Post 417 was ratified. In addition, the Department of Florida will lease property to Post 416 for \$1 a year. The property is located in Moore Haven and previously belonged to Post 299 before losing its charter.

### 4. Post Charters to be Pulled

The Charter of Hastings Post 102 was pulled due to not having volunteers to step up and assume leadership roles.

### 5. Post Name Change Requests

A motion passed to accept Post 390's name change request to American Legion Post

390, Wellington, Inc.

### 6. Department Finance Committee Report

A report on Department's financials as of March 31, 2022, was given by Finance Chairman Larry White. Department's Profit & Loss statement shows total income of \$2,789,367, total expenses of \$2,886,951, giving a deficit of \$97,583. This deficit does not reflect income from LIT of \$331,770 and National Fundraising of \$76,677, which was received after March 31, 2022. The DEC approved the proposed 2022-2023 Budget. The budgeted total income \$3,429,100, and total budgeted expenses is \$3,425,910. With a net income difference of \$3,190.

### 7. Ukraine Fundraiser

There was a discussion on the Ukraine relief effort fundraiser and how to utilize the funds already obtained. The total amount raised to date is about \$10,500. The Southern Area is collecting items to create care packages to send to Poland for Ukraine refugees. The DEC approved using the funds to cover shipping costs to send the care packages overseas. Any remaining funds would be used to purchase products to send overseas.

### 8. Sale of Formal Post 52's and Formal Post 102's Property

The DEC approved for the Department of Florida to sell the property of formal Post 52 in Panasoffkee, Florida, and formal Post 102's property in Hastings, Florida.

The DEC went into Executive Session for post trial appeals following the above discussions.

### **DEC MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION**

A regular meeting of the Department Executive Committee (DEC) was held on Sunday, June 19, 2022, at 9:30 AM at the Hilton Orlando Lake Buena as required per Article VII, Section 10 of Department's Constitution. Department Commander Eunice Butts conducted the meeting. Forty-nine DEC members were present.
