Instead, they choose to bear the leadership completely on their own, making important decisions that affect the entire organization.

First off, let me thank you for electing me to the office of Your National Executive Committee Alternate. It has been a privilege in serving you this past year as Department Commander and allowing me to

continue to represent you at National.

Thanks to you, the Pact Act was passed in the United States Congress. This Act was designed to assist our Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans from the disease and illness they have or may have received from the Burn Pits. On bases established for America's post-9/11 wars, the U.S. military's trash was often burned in huge, open-air lots on the perimeters of the overseas outposts. Items burned includes but not limit to: used medical supplies, computers, jet fuel, paint thinners, etc. The toxic smoke that came out of the burn pits affected not only the crew burning, but often the entire base.

As you know there was a delay in the Senate in the passing of this bill, however thanks to the Grassroots Action of the American Legion, this bill was approved and signed by the President.

Number of Calls received by our Senators:

Florida – 4,728 calls received Texas – 1,664 calls received Pennsylvania – 1,652 calls received New York – 1,652 calls received California – 1,628 calls received

Thank you again for those who took the time to reach out to our Senators to assist in this action.

Another Item that is coming up at the National Convention, is Resolution No.

1. Subject: Amend American Legion Constitution and By-Laws to allow Multi-Year and Rolling Memberships.

The Resolved Clause indicates the following:

RESOLVED, That the American Legion Bylaws, Article IV, Section 4, "Discipline of Post and Post Members" be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. A member whose dues for the current year have not been paid on the member's renewal date by January first shall be classed as delinquent. If their dues are paid within 30 days of expiration, on or before February First, the member shall be automatically reinstated. If the member is still delinquent 30 days after expiration after February first, the member shall be suspended from all privileges. If the member is still under the suspension 120 days following expiration on June first of

such year, their membership in The American Legion shall be forfeited. A member so suspended or whose membership has been so forfeited may be reinstated to active membership in good standing by vote of the Post and payment of current dues for the year in which the reinstatement occurs: however, the Posts, Departments and the National Organization may waive the provisions hereof, upon payment of dues for the year in which the reinstatement occurs, with the reference to former members who have been prevented from the payment of dues by reason of active military service; and, be it finally

RESOLVED, That the passage of these recommended amendments to the National Constitution and National By-laws by the National Convention shall not create either multi-year and/or rolling memberships until they are enacted through the normal resolution Process.

We will vote on this Amendment at the National Convention, but the Amendment looks to allow multi-year membership, and to make your Due Date the date you joined, more details will be provided as we learn them.

Let me know if there is anything else I can assist with.

2025 National Convention

Tampa was chosen to host the 2025
National Convention, the first convention
to be held in Florida since Orlando in 1997.
While it is three years out, I thought I'd
introduce the Committees that will be
required to be filled by volunteers. A lot
will rely on the Legionnaires, Auxiliary
members, SAL members and Riders
volunteers to make it a success.

There are 5 committees (Badges and

Packets, Distinguished Guests, Information/ Registration, Memorial Service and Special Events) required by National to have a successful convention, plus a Tampa Liaison.

I will give a brief description of the duties of each. More specific duties will be described as we get closer and need to start signing up volunteers.

The Liaison is someone with political connections locally and perhaps statewide. They may be asked to assist with agencies

such as police, fire, public works, parks & recreation, mayor's office and airport officials. The individual should also be familiar with local businesses such as retail stores, restaurants, recreational facilities, transportation companies and other businesses that could impact convention activities.

The Badges and Packets Committee is responsible for setting up the Office located in the Convention Center. Badges and

Packets for The American Legion, Auxiliary and Sons of The American Legion are shipped from National Headquarters to this office. The bags must be assembled for each delegate and for each Department. The estimated number of assistants needed is 28-30.

The Distinguished Guests Committee has a Chair and two Vice Chairs. The Vice Chairs are the Distinguished Guests Registration Chair and the Distinguished Guests Holding Area Chair. The Committee will also need two full time drivers for the National Commander and for the National Adjutant.

The estimated number of assistants needed is 2-6 for each committee. The duties of each committee are exactly as they sound.

The Information/Registration Committee mans the desks set up in the convention center to answer questions from the attendees. National will provide binders with lots of information in them. The estimated number of assistants needed is 8-10.

The Memorial Service Committee coordinates with the National Chaplain to set up the service, proved rooming arrangements that may be required and provide volunteers to assist with seating

attendees. The estimated number of assistants needed is 3-5.

The Special Events Committee coordinates meeting the requirements for all special events scheduled, whether it be obtaining permits, coordinating with city agencies (police, fire, sanitation, emergency management, etc.) and must be a resident of the city. The estimated number of assistants is 30 or more.

This brief overview will give you an idea of the immense project Florida has taken on, and how important your support and volunteering will be to its success.



Americanism Plan of Attack - Developing your Concept of the Operation (CONOP)

Hello Department of Florida, American Legion Family. I trust you are all doing well. Before I begin, I want to send out a BIG CONGRATULATIONS to the AI Krietemeyer, American Legion Post 284, Baseball Team who represented the Department of Florida at the American Legion World Series in August. An unbelievable group of high schoolers, some of which who just graduated, that did an amazing job representing the Department of Florida. Just in case you didn't know, American Legion Baseball falls under the Americanism

There are a couple topics I want to address with you in this issue. Number one is your "Americanism Program Plan of Attack" and the second is, Flag Etiquette. If you recall, in my introductory article last month, I stated you should develop your "Americanism Program Plan of Attack" by reviewing the Department 2022-2023 Event Timeline and decide how you are going to move forward with the Program or Programs you are going to do this year. On that note, I hope that all the District Americanism Chairs have been reaching out to the respective Post Chairs to aide them with their plan.

So, let's get down to business, summer is over, and the school year has begun. Yes, the school buses are out, picking up and dropping off children and we are getting reacquainted with excess traffic. Not to mention, having to slow down our speed in school zones, stopping when children are getting on and off the buses; and now we need to add in an extra 20 minutes or so to our commute time. One may say this is annoying, but for the American Legion, this is actually a great time of the year. No, I haven't lost my mind. You see, the school year is the best time of the year for us in the American Legion. Why? Because this is when we can really make a difference with the delivery of our Americanism Programs. This is when we can ramp up our presence in the schools so that we can engage with

the youth of our communities and share our Americanism Program opportunities with School Administrators, Guidance Counselors, Teachers, and Staff.

Getting our foot in the door in September is critical to mission success. During September, we should be contacting local high schools for Boys State and Oratorical Program participants. September also means Shooting Sports Registration and 1st Round Target Sales open. Get into those schools, set up meetings, post American Legion Program information on those School Bulletin Boards. Today's High Schools have websites, where they post information for the students and parents; they use email and have daily electronic text notices they send out to the student body about upcoming events, programs, scholarships and the like. These are great tools that we should take advantage of to ensure maximum delivery of our Americanism Programs.

Just like your days in uniform, when you had a mission, you developed a Concept of Operation (CONOP). How am I going to accomplish the mission set before me? The same principal applies here. I am not going to limit myself by having only one method of delivery. I am going to have a multiple pronged attack to maximize the delivery or completion of said mission. I believe you get my point and my meaning. What's your CONOP going to be?

Don't be dismayed if one teacher or one guidance counselor doesn't seem receptive to the program you are presenting or that you want them to help with, there are other teachers, there are other avenues of approach. Don't forget that most high schools have JROTC Units. Now there is a good source for getting your foot in the door. Just trying to give you some ideas to make your Post and District more successful and ultimately, the Department of Florida. So, get out there and make your presence known throughout the schools in your locale.

The second topic I want to address with you is the US Flag. The American Flag is our nation's most cherished material object. She proudly flies in front of our American Legion Posts', and we salute her at the beginning and closing of our meetings and we pay her respect at events throughout the year. To each of us who served our "Great Nation", the US Flag is more than symbolic, it is part of who we are as Veterans, as Americans, and as Legionnaires - she signifies freedom, democracy, and strength.

Over the past couple weeks, I've received a few inquiries regarding proper disposal of the US Flag. The American Legion has a prescribed ceremony for the disposal of unserviceable flags, and this is a great opportunity for you to invite your community to view and take part in the ceremony. Invite local officials, invite local Scout Troops and JROTC Units to assist with the ceremony. This is just another forum for us to maximize our community engagement to promote Americanism. Now, if you are like may Posts', that receive too many flags throughout the year and must do multiple ceremonies throughout the year - that is fine and acceptable. Just ensure you conduct the ceremony in a profession and respectful manner.

I've also been called and asked if the flag can still be flown if it has accidentally touched the ground or can a flag be washed. These are all good questions... And the answer to both questions is YES. Having been asked these questions, I did some additional research and retrieved some information that I want to share with you directly from The American Legion. All you need to do is get online and type in the URLs I have provided below, that will provide you with definitive information.

I want to take this opportunity to thank Commander Butts for letting me serve as the Disaster Preparedness chair for 2022-2023.

Hurricane season runs from June 1 to Nov 30 each year with peak

season being from mid-August to mid-October. I received the roster of all the posts, out of 300+ only 50 have chair. In order to receive the material for Disaster Preparedness, each post in the state has to send in a chair's name.

This is the time to check your insurance to make sure it is up to date, also to make sure your familiar with your escape route if deemed necessary. The safety of your family is #1, when your advised to evacuate you should follow the instructions, it's for your safety.

This is a good time to make sure portable generators, chain saws and any other equipment necessary for cleanup is in good operating condition if the time arises. Also check your hurricane supply kits from previous year and replenish if necessary.

To give you an idea of what this year will be like, early tropical storm forecasts are predicting between 16 and 21 named storms with 6 to 9 hurricanes, 3 to 5 being major hurricanes. In the past we have had storms in mid to late May. The season may be changed

to May 15 to Nov 30 due to the climate change and storms starting to develop in late May.

There is a great concern for the population increase in Florida. A lot of the population moving to Florida have never experienced a hurricane which is concerning, therefore those of us who have experienced hurricanes should look out for those who have not and teach them the importance of getting prepared to make the event tolerable.

I would like to do a live stream on Facebook to help educate those who are not familiar with the procedures of hurricanes before, during, and after a storm. I will do my best to keep everyone informed of events to come. I may be reached at 305-968-7979 or gonepost1@aol.com.

Resolution No. 23: Immigration Reform Origin: National Security Commission

WHEREAS, The American Legion's Preamble to our Constitution states: "We associate ourselves together for the following purposes ... to maintain law and order... to promote peace and goodwill on earth ... to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy ... "; and

WHEREAS, Members of The American Legion, having been exposed to the effects of poverty and oppression through military service, have a special understanding of the challenges many people of the world have, and we have a special concern for freedom; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion believes in legal immigration into the United States and a path toward becoming a United States citizen; and

WHEREAS, The United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency estimates that there are 11.4 million undocumented immigrants currently residing within the United States; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Homeland Security, Office of Audits stated that each year more than one million individuals attempt to enter the United States without proper documentation or enter legally and then violate the provisions of their visas; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that approximately 45% of the undocumented immigrants in the United States have arrived legally but overstayed their visa; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on May 4-5, 2022, That The American Legion urges the United States government to adopt immigration reform policy that emphasizes border security, focusing on funding for barriers where needed, fielding of advanced technologies, and fully manning the border; and, be it further

and discourage illegal immigration; and, be it further

It must be serendipity. While perusing articles on line about public speaking and looking for inspiration for the Legion Link, I clicked on an article by Florida political writer and speaker, Blake Dowling, titled "What it Takes to Write a Great Life Lesson' Speech."

If you are at a school promoting the contest, handing these out is a good way to start a conversation with someone about the contest. Secondly, <u>www.constitutionspeechprep.</u> <u>com.</u> Caroline Freeman, a 2012 National Semi-Finalist wrote a helpful guide for students who are thinking about competing. She breaks down more about the craft of choosing historical examples to use, relating them to contemporary times, building an outline. I think it's very helpful, especially for students that do not have help from speech and debate teachers. You can purchase a copy of it for \$14.99 at the link above. I have a few copies I can disseminate by email. It's about 60 pages.



PACT ACT Information

I'm happy to announce that by the time this article is published, there will have opened two new Veterans Nursing facilities, one in Port St. Lucie and the other in Orlando. These new facilities will not only give Florida a total of nine skilled facilities of

this type, the most in any other state in our great nation but further demonstrates that we take care of our fellow veterans.

As we continue to learn of the far-reaching effects of the COVID pandemic, the VA has implemented a program to assist veterans who lost jobs due to the pandemic. The Veteran Rapid Retraining Assistance Program offers veterans between the ages of 22 and 66 years of age education and training for a variety of high demand jobs in order that they can get back to work. If any veterans fall into this category, enrollment is open only until December 11, 2022.

Since August brought us a monumental piece of legislation, The PACT Act, having been signed into law I'd like to highlight just some of its elements since it's estimated that this law potentially affects the lives of approximately 3.5 million veterans: It is often referred to as Burn Pit Exposure legislation, however the law goes beyond just that.

For example, it adds two additional presumptive conditions due to Agent Orange exposure..hypertension and monoclonal gammopathy.

These will directly affect our Viet Nam veterans. In connection with that, new presumptive locations have been added...Any U.S or Royal Thai military base in Thailand between Jan 9, 1962 and June 30, 1976. Also Laos, between 1965-1969; Guam or American Samoa or the territorial waters off their coasts from 1962-1980.

Certain cancers have also been included as being presumptive; Brain Cancer; Gastrointestinal cancer of any type; Glioblastoma, Kidney cancer and Lymphatic cancer of any type; Melanoma; Neck and/ or Pancreatic cancer; Reproductive cancer of any type and Respiratory cancer of any type.

In addition to the above there are now 12 newly announced illnesses that are classified as presumptive. This law's passages also addresses the needs of veterans who served in over 20 Middle Eastern countries from 1990 to after 2001. As you see, the PACT Act is far reaching and as everyone agrees, long overdue.

The VA has acknowledged that it is continuing to prepare to process claims related to this law. I encourage any veterans who have been affected to speak with your local Post Service Officer, FDVA or County Service Officer to begin the filing process. VA will be accepting claims however won't begin processing them until January 2023.

In closing, by the time this is published I will have once again attended The American Legion's National Convention and look forward to being able to share what I learn there.

Department of Veterans Affairs, women represent the fastest-growing population in both military service and the veteran community. Women are represented in record numbers in new vital roles that contribute to our nation's freedoms. Even though women are consistently breaking down barriers, they bear unique challenges their male veterans may not experience.

A recent survey by the Department of Veterans Affairs found that female veterans experience military sexual trauma (MST), anxiety, and depression at higher rates than male veterans. The research identified how the female veterans had feelings of isolation, loneliness, and struggles to identify with other veterans and non-veteran females.

How can the American Legion Department of Florida, assist the nearly 155,000 female veterans in the state of Florida? We can start by listening. Commander Eunice Butts wants to understand the top challenges facing our female veterans in Florida and provide the appropriate resources to address those challenges.

Honoring WWII Veteran

On Friday, July 29th, 2022 World War II Veteran Seaman Mr. Stephen Alex Nemeth was distinguished on the behalf ot the President of the French Republic with the Legion of Honor from the Consul General of France in Miami, Vincent Floreani, during a moving ceremony, hosted by the American Legion Post 10 in Kissimmee, FL.

Mr. Nemeth's family, veterans and volunteers at the American Legion, representatives from the government of Florida, as well as members of the French military and the French community, attended the ceremony.

"We are forever indebted to all of you for defending our freedom at the risk of your

lives and the welfare of your families", said Consul general, Vincent Floreani, and "We must never forget it is the bravery of individual men and women who chose to risk their lives in the name of our freedom and fundamental values which led to the victory of democracy over barabity."

This meaningful ceremony offered also a rare connection to the World War II

generation and placed a spotlight on the importance of French-American relations over many generations.

Several news outlets, such as the Osceola News Gazette, WESH Channel 2 which made a video report,

and USA Warrior Stories, a non-profit organization preserving veteran stories and legacies, who is preparing an interview with Mr. Nemeth that should air around september, to tell his story.

Mr Stephen Alex Nemeth, Seaman 1st class within the U.S. Navy, helped liberate France and Europe from the Nazi regime. Mr Nemeth joined the military on February 10th, 1943 and was immediately assigned to a special unit known as the "Armed

Guard", responsible for counter-attacks against Nazi naval operations targeting merchant vessels, including many French ones, in the English Channel and the Atlantic.

To this end, Mr Nemeth served successively aboard the SS Surprise, the SS Abel Parker Upshur and ultimately the SS Santa Paula, American warships which took part in combat operations against enemy ships targeting Allied vessels and helped transport troops and ammunition used during D-Day and the Liberation of Normandy; these vital transportation missions often led to military confrontations during which the "Armed Guard" was deployed.

While serving aboard the SS Abel Parker Upshur (from February 15 to August 18 1944), Mr Nemeth helped deliver 8,000 tons of ammunition used on the beaches of Normandy, and secured the landing of 1,000 soldiers in Cherbourg while the city was still in enemy hands.

Through his military involvement in the struggles that took place in the Channel and off the coast of Normandy (during both D-Day and the Battle of Normandy) and the numerous convoys he was assigned to in extremely hostile conditions, Mr Stephen Alex NEMETH helped secure victory for the Allied forces.

Established in 1802 by Napoléon Bonaparte, this honor, which represents the highest award of the French Republic, can be bestowed upon French citizens as well as foreign nationals. In this way, France demonstrates its recognition towards the men who fought beside her during the Second World War: "France will never forget."

France, through the Consulate General of France in Miami, has recognized over 1,600 American WWII Veterans in Florida and Puerto Rico since 2008.

TAMPA — Marine Corps veteran and Tampa resident Barry Morgan didn't know how he was going to be able to make it to his soon-to-be 6-year-old granddaughter's birthday party in New Jersey next weekend.

But now, he'll not only be able to make the trip, he'll be arriving in style.

Online car retailer Carvana, IndyCar driver and seven-time NASCAR champion Jimmie Johnson, as well as the Tampa chapter of the American Legion, teamed up to surprise Morgan Thursday with a much-needed new set of wheels.

He was chosen through the Carvana Cares program to receive an electric blue Honda Civic by members of the American Legion.

"I am truly thankful and grateful for this," Morgan said. "It's definitely a blessing."

Morgan, who thought he was attending a meet-and-greet with Johnson to honor the

local veteran community, also received a membership to American Legion U.S.S. Tampa Post 5. Worldwide, the American Legion is made up of almost two million brothers- and sisters-in-arms.

During the presentation at the Carvana Car Vending Machine, the team did a "test run" to show how it works. Morgan was completely caught off guard to learn he was the new owner of the car coming down the machine.

"When I saw my name on the sign — 'Winner Barry Morgan' — I was frozen for a second," he said.

Previously, Morgan didn't have a reliable vehicle. His old truck had become inoperable and was in need of a new engine, which would have cost him thousands of dollars. Because of a lack of transportation, he hasn't been able to see his family in months and struggled to find employment.

"To meet Barry, to see how much this means to him, it's the most incredible thing. It's really been a cool day," said Johnson. "Ultimately, good things happen to good people. Barry is that man."

While taking his new car out for a test drive, with Johnson riding along in the passenger seat, Johnson asked Morgan where he was going to go first. Morgan had a quick and emotional response.

"My granddaughter, Ava, her birthday is next Friday (in New Jersey)," said Morgan. "I was afraid I was going to have to tell them I couldn't make it, but now it looks like I'm going to be able to make it and visit my granddaughter on her birthday."


A couple of important areas on the postcard are related to this feature, "Accept Automatic Transfers" and "Post Membership Requirements". If your Post
